GENERAL ARPA UPDATE

- Human Services to receive:
 - \$900,000 for Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)
 - \$800,000 for Office on Aging programs
 - Other programs (SNAP, TANF) still to be determined
- Workforce Development: \$1.5 million over 3 years
- Both are adding limited term positions



State Use of ARPA Funds:

- Behavioral & Mental Health Cash Fund \$550M
- CDPHE Public Health Infrastructure \$10M
- Economic Recovery & Cash Relief Fund \$848M
 - COVID-19 Victims Services \$15M
 - Broadband Deployment \$75M
- Workers, Employers, & Workforce Centers Cash Fund \$50M
- Affordable Housing & Home Ownership Cash Fund \$550M

Government, Education, & Policy

Increase Collaboration with School Districts – Regularly meeting with PSD, looking to engage TSD & Estes outside of Recovery Structure & develop task force

Identify Mechanisms for Advisement on Equity – In process of developing bylaws for County B/C on equity advisement, will continue to engage CS&EAB, work with other equity groups at County for collaboration, awareness

Evaluate & Foster Remote Work Culture – This is in process, County leadership continues to work with department leads to identify how best to encourage remote work culture, also in process of improving remote work infrastructure, development of stipends, etc

Maintain Minimum Footprint of County Facilities – In process, County leadership continues to work with IT & Facilities to determine where county offices can be reduced, and identify opportunities for additional uses of work spaces

Rural Broadband Infrastructure Development – Completed pilot project with partners utilizing CVRF funding, now working with partners to identify where this can be expanded and improved with ARPA opportunities



Workforce, Small Business, & Economic Development

Additional Conservation Corps for Fire Recovery – In place & engaging in projects

Level Up Program – This program built a lot of social capital and strong relationships with impacted business owners, and established a framework that can be used should we have future similar events, or a second surge. To date, due to current situation, Level Up has been ramped down

Expansion of Small Business PIVOT Program – This is in process, and each cohort that engaged in this program was largely successful. Local businesses are utilized as consultants, and this program is being utilized now in other parts of the state as a model. Can be adapted as continued lessons are learned from the event

Reignite our Economy Plan – Currently in final draft form



Skills Transferability Study Highlights

- Estimated job loss in during the pandemic: 7,600
- 53% of job losses were in Food Service, Retail & Hospitality
- Women, Hispanic and younger workers are particularly vulnerable, especially those without a college degree.
- More than 80% of the jobs lost require a high school degree, its equivalent or less.

A word on occupational sorting...

- Job creation approach must look different. Explore jobs with fewer educational requirements, greater volume of jobs, and career pathways.
- Recommendation are in three primary categories: Working with Job Seekers, Working with Employers, Enhancing the Workforce and Economic Development System

- Reinforce planning and communication to address isolation for older adults
- Incorporate resilience lens to Strategic Plan initiative to ID proper County Housing and Homelessness role
- Identify and coordination of existing programs and initiatives to minimize redundancies and capitalize on resources for non-profit, volunteer, and faith-based sector
- Continue to expand outreach regarding SNAP & food security, continue to strengthen existing partnerships
- Utilize current partnership with NFRMPO to identify how model for vaccine transportation can be expanded for non-emergent transportation supports
- Continued support and strengthening of current behavioral health initiatives
- Continued support for addressing access to affordable childcare

Operation of a Housing Program – This position has been hired and program development and initiation is in process

Ongoing Physical Health Recovery– As PH returns to regular role, coordination to determine roles & responsibilities for recovery is ongoing






Use the "Bucket Model" from Coronavirus Relief Fund (CVRF) based on guidance categories:



"Make [childcare] affordable to encourage stay at home mothers to be able to work."

"Provide entry level job placement assistance for new graduates."

"Create public health jobs to address health and wellness. Collaborate with schools."

"Water and water treatment should be ahead of anything else. Without them there is no future Larimer County."

"Water treatment facility is greatly needed in Wellington. Currently the citizens are being heavily charged with an increase of approximately 300% in base rate. We need help or we will not be able to afford to live here."
