### **CURRENT SITUATION:**

**DESCRIPTION:** The Larimer Emergency Operations Center (EOC) has been activated for 118 days and continues to respond to the effects of the Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic.

There are currently 1021 confirmed and suspect cases in Larimer County with 29 deaths reported. We have started to see an increase in daily cases which is an early warning indicator. Please see the attached News Release for more details.

**Public Health Operations:** The Case Contact and Monitoring Group continues to issue isolation and quarantine orders as required to limit the spread of the virus. A large majority of cases are now between the ages of 20-30 years old and this appears to be a trend in our community. The Compliance Team continues to conduct site visits, mostly to restaurants since last update. The Outbreak Team works with facilities that have confirmed or suspected outbreaks as defined by CDPHE. Additionally, this team is working with a few facilities that have 1 case, helping them to be proactive in their response.

**Testing:** There has been an increase in demand for testing, leading the testing team to stop allowing walk-ins. Testing is currently working with IT to streamline registration processes to better accommodate demand and current capacity. Community testing capacity has also expanded through Salud in Estes Park and Fort Collins. It is important to note that people should not change their behavior in any way should they have antibodies; continuing to follow physical distancing, wash their hands frequently, and stay home if they develop symptoms of COVID-19, regardless of whether they have antibodies to COVID-19 or a negative nasal swab test.

Supply Chain: Larimer OEM urges all partners and businesses to begin ordering PPE supplies now, if they haven't already, in anticipation of fall and winter needs. Even though the supply chain has gotten better over time, there is still a backlog of orders leading to delays of up to 6 weeks to 2 months. The ability for Larimer to secure future supplies from the State/SNS remains unknown at this time.

Recovery: The Recovery Collaborative has developed 17 Task Forces to address recovery needs across multiple sectors. The recovery from this event will be long and will impact almost every person in the county in some way or another. Meetings are occurring multiple times each week in different focus areas, and they involve city/county partners, non-governmental partners, non-profits and volunteer organizations. The initial priority is developing a fundamental understanding of immediate impacts, with the deadline to have those recorded within the next 30 days. 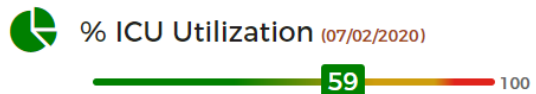
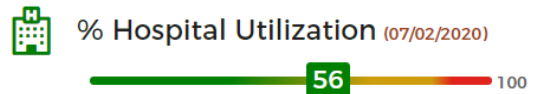
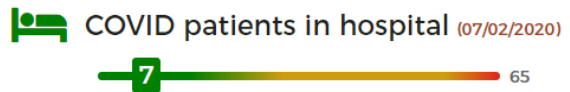
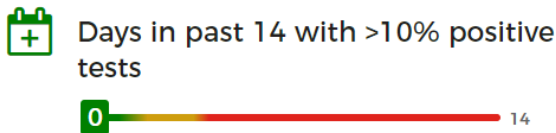
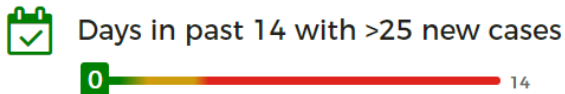


LCDHE and the EOC are currently monitoring early warning triggers. We are noticing upticks in daily positive cases (was previously about 4 cases per day but moving to 8-10 cases per day on average) as well as upticks in persons currently being treated in the hospital for COVID (approximately 7-9 per day on average). And as stated previously, we are seeing a rise in cases in the 20-30 age group.

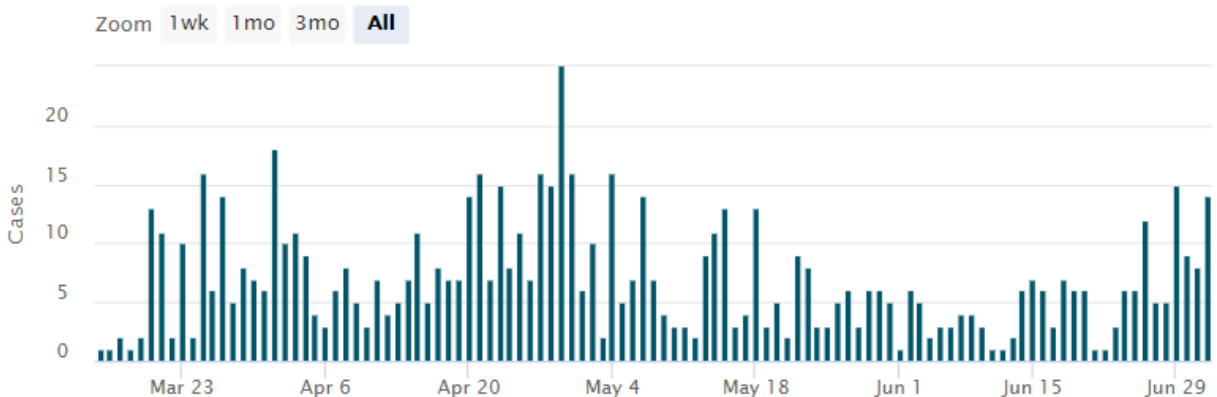

## Risk Score: **Medium**

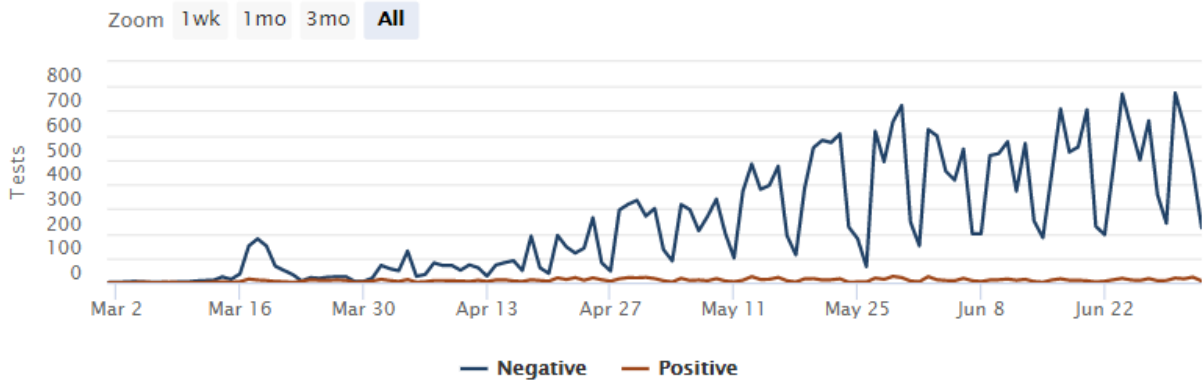
Larimer County has flattened the curve, but the curve doesn't go away. We must stay diligent in our social distancing, handwashing and face coverings to keep our community safe.



## Cases by Day

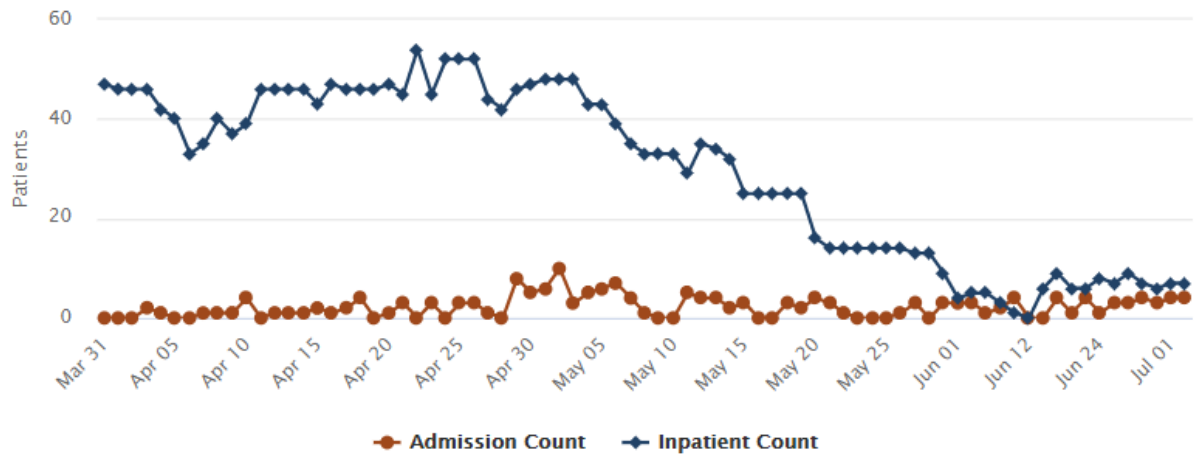


## Tests by Day



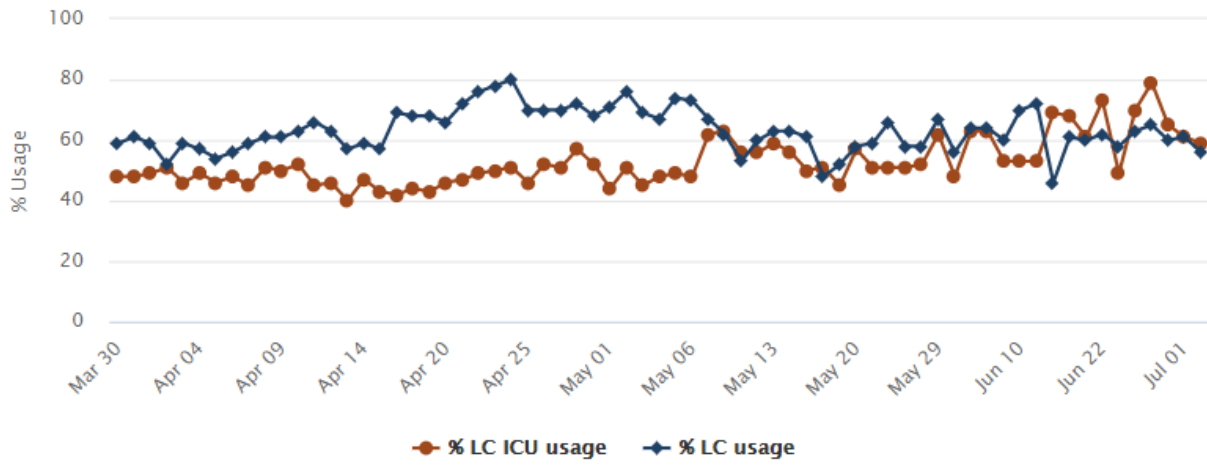
## COVID Hospital Patients

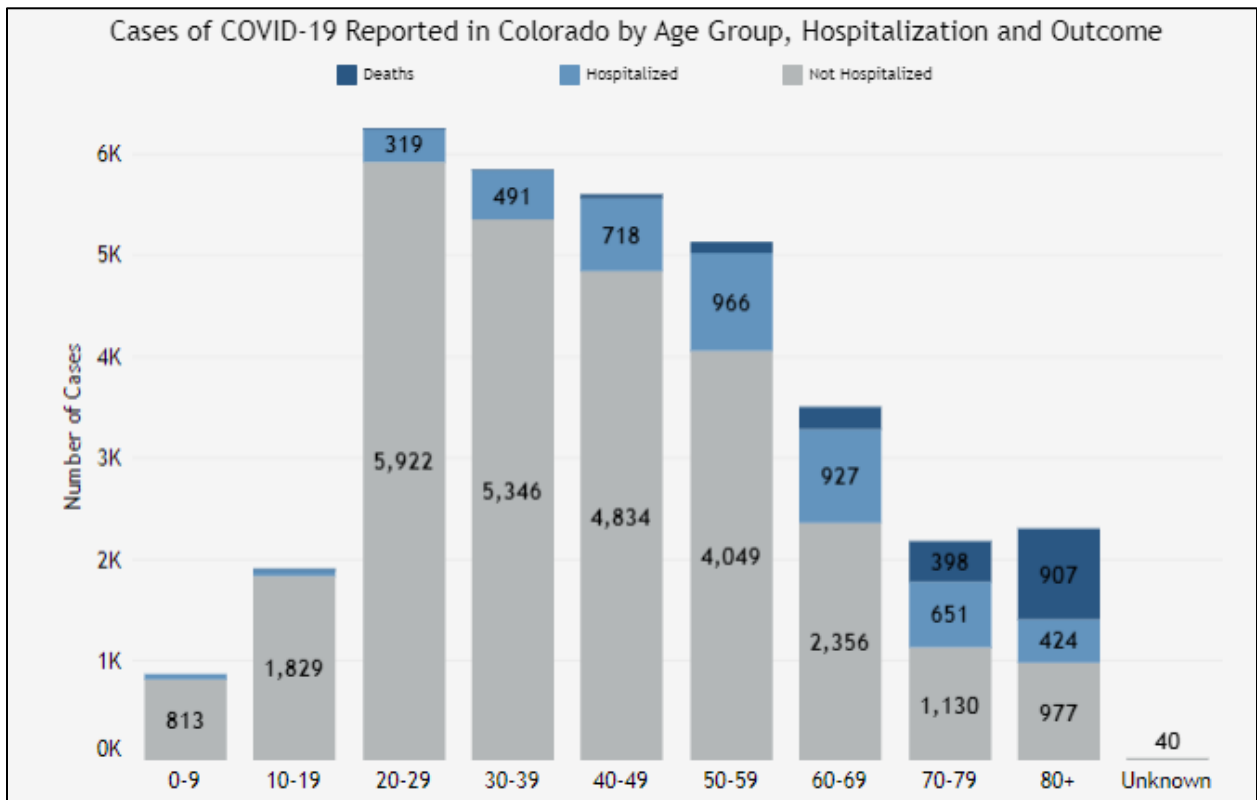
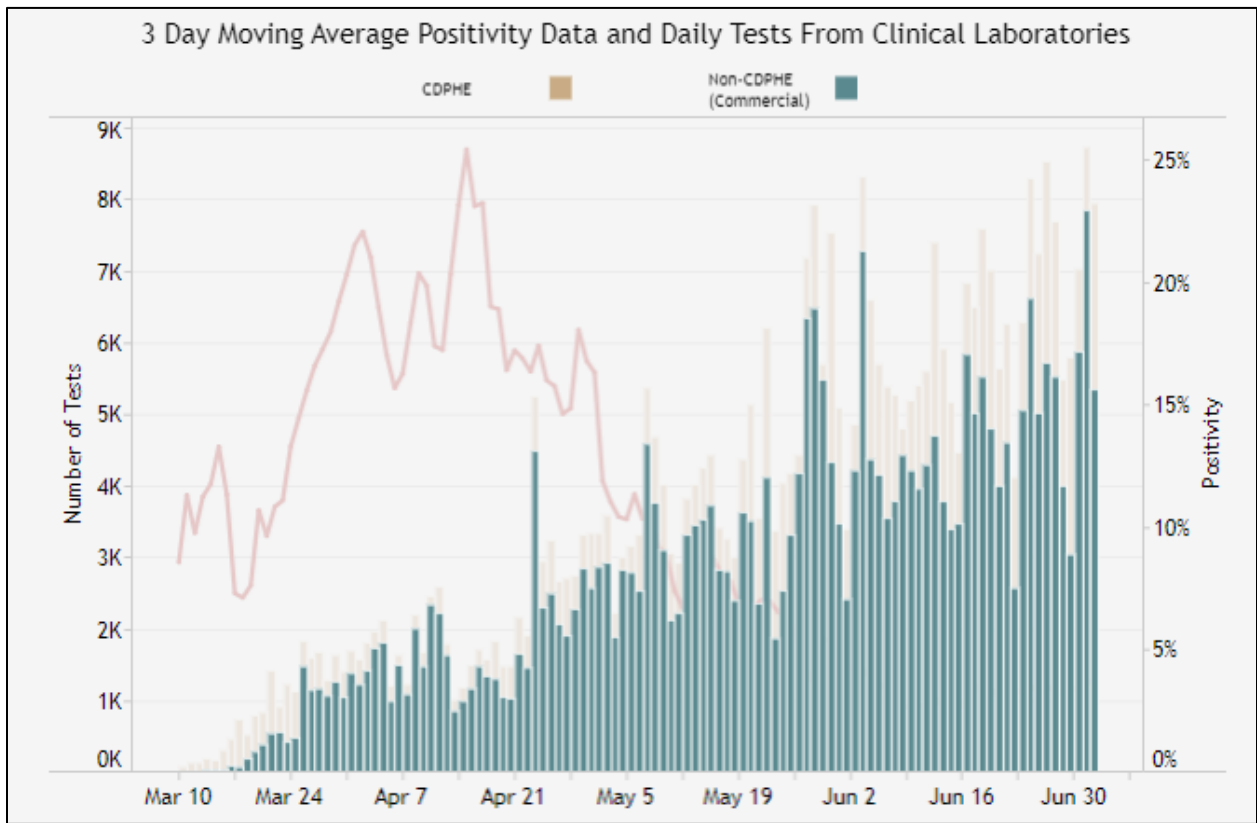
